# Highlights from the Office of Head Start - Program Information Report (PIR) Summary Report - 2024 - State Level - Mississippi

#### What is Head Start?

Head Start and Early Head Start programs are free, federally funded programs designed to promote school readiness for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers from families that meet income eligibility requirements. (Child Care.Gov).

#### How is it funded?

The funding level for programs under the Head Start Act (the Act) is \$12,271,820,000, an increase of \$275 million over FY 2023. This funding level provides all Head Start, Early Head Start, and Early Head Start-Child Care (EHS-CC) Partnership grant recipients a 2.35% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA).

# How is the funding used?

The majority of funding is spent on staff, including teachers, assistant teachers, family service workers, home visitors, bus drivers, cooks, janitors, and many others necessary to operate the Head Start program. In addition to serving children living in poverty, these staff also serve a large number of children in foster care, experiencing homelessness, and with disabilities. Any remaining funds are spent on other necessary and allowable costs such as supplies and facilities.


